Riparian Restoration

We're excited to share progress on the Humptulips Riparian Restoration project! This project focuses on supporting natural plant succession by underplanting conifers in an alder-dominated floodplain along a unique side channel of the river. Funded through the Aquatic Species Restoration Program, it addresses key habitat features that salmon need to thrive. The native spruce, hemlock, and cedar we're planting will intercept rainfall and provide shade to keep the river clean and cold. Over time, these trees will also contribute wood to the river, which helps slow flows, shape gravel bars, and create pools essential for salmon spawning, refuge, and cover during their migration. We are grateful to our project partner, the Grays Harbor Audubon Society, and the landowners for joining us in improving fish and wildlife habitat in the Humptulips watershed.





Grays Harbor Conservation District is hiring Riparian Restoration Crew Members and a Marine Resiliency Technician. Full-time, permanent positions starting winter 2025/2026 in Elma, WA, with work throughout Grays Harbor County. These positions are dependent on continued grant funding.

Starting wage: \$21/hr

Balancing Agriculture and Conservation: Fence Cost Share Success

As part of our ongoing Agriculture Program, this fence cost share project helped local landowners improve livestock management through cross fencing for rotational grazing. Funded by the Voluntary Stewardship Program (VSP), the project focused on reducing nutrient and pathogen runoff, protecting surface and groundwater, and improving pasture and soil health. The property, located near wetlands and within a flood zone, historically faced challenges with livestock concentrating on limited high ground during seasonal flooding. By installing new fencing and creating designated paddocks, the project improved grazing distribution, enhanced forage conditions, and supported long-term agricultural viability, all while safeguarding nearby natural resources.

Grays Harbor Conservation District will hold a **poll-site election** for one board seat on **Friday, March 13, 2026**, at:

Polling Hours: 12-7 p.m.

Who Can Vote?

- Any registered voter living within the Conservation District boundary is eligible.
- Voters may vote in person on Election Day without requesting a ballot.

Optional Mail or Drop-Off Ballots (If You Can't Vote in Person)

This is a poll-site election, where most voters will cast their ballot in person on Election Day. However, if you won't be able to make it to the polls, you may request a ballot for mail or hand-delivery.

- Ballot request deadline: February 20, 2026, 5 p.m.
- **How to request:** In person at the GHCD office, by phone (360-214-9620), or by email (khunter@graysharborcd.org).
- Returning your ballot:
 - **By mail:** Must be postmarked by March 13, 2026.
 - In person: Must be returned to the GHCD office by 7 p.m. on Election Day.
- If you prefer, you do **not need** to request a ballot you can simply vote in person at the polling site on March 13.

Interested in Running for the Open Seat?

- Candidates must be registered voters residing within the Conservation
 District boundary.
- Filing deadline: February 13, 2026, at 5 p.m.


