

Restoring Wynoochee River Headwaters

Grays Harbor Conservation District has been working with Green Diamond Resource Company to restore natural function to the headwater streams of the Wynoochee River. This one-mile project in the Schafer Creek watershed includes 115 post-assisted log structures (PALs), simple, low-impact wood structures that mimic natural woody debris. PALs slow erosion, store sediment and water, and create more complex in-stream habitat for aquatic species. By jumpstarting the process, we're helping streams regain these functions in decades instead of centuries.

Thanks to Green Diamond's donation of pre-commercial thinning material, Washington Conservation Corps crews and GHCD's Restoration Crew are building posts to anchor the PALs securely into the stream bed.



Cranberry Farm Drainage Project Supports Agriculture and Watershed Health



The Grays Harbor Conservation District worked with a local cranberry grower to restore a drainage ditch, with support from the Washington State Conservation Commission's Shellfish Investments Program. This project helps reduce localized flooding, improves water quality for downstream shellfish beds, and supports both healthy farms and healthy watersheds.

A big thank-you to the landowners who contributed labor and materials—partnerships like this make projects possible!

Connecting the Community: Grays Harbor Stream Team



Since welcoming a new coordinator in October 2024, the Grays Harbor Stream Team—housed within the Conservation District—has been busy engaging the community in local restoration and habitat projects. From volunteer plantings and storm drain

cleanings to river and boat lodge trash sweeps and even trivia nights, the Stream Team creates hands-on opportunities to make a difference in our waterways.

River Roots: Brewing Conservation, One Beer at a Time


The Conservation District has teamed up with Mount Olympus Brewing to create River Roots, an American pale ale brewed with salmon-safe hops. This unique collaboration blends community outreach with environmental stewardship—each beer sold supports tree planting in the Chehalis Basin, with the District pledging to plant one tree for every beer purchased. Since the start of the partnership in late 2023, over 12,037 beers have been sold, and the initiative continues to grow.

Beyond enjoying the beer, community members can roll up their sleeves and help plant the trees themselves.

Volunteer events have taken place at Kurt Cobain Memorial Park, Zelasko Park, Stewart Memorial Park, and on local landowner properties along the Wishkah and Hoquiam Rivers. The program is now expanding throughout the Chehalis Basin to bring plantings to additional river systems across the county.

This collaboration is a creative way to engage the community, improve local habitats, and make every sip count toward a healthier watershed.






